How to share your faith in writing for print and digital media

Let us pray.

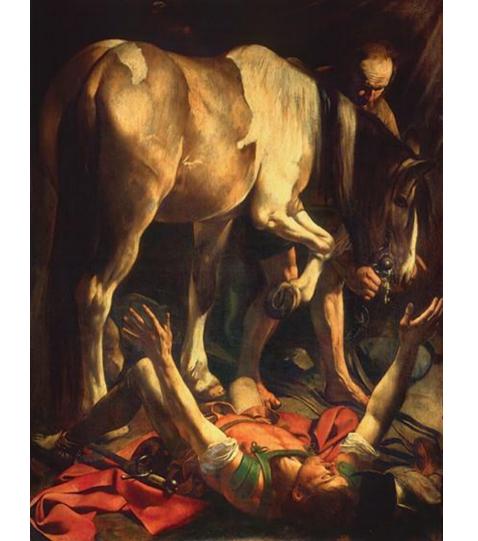

St. Paul's Conversion

Saul to Paul Acts 7:58-9:30

Key moments in the story:

- Before Christ
- Encounter
- Effect (interior)
- Effect (outward)

OK, now it's time to get started

Writing process

- → Get it out!
- → Who is it for?
- → The revision process
- → Avoiding common pitfalls
 - → Sharing

 Note: everyone has a different writing process. This is just a suggestion. Find what works for you.

Get it out!

- Don't worry about form, flow or even spelling— just get your story on the page!
- Prayerful writing vs. just writing
- Easiest to write out everything chronologically
- Choose the beginning & ending points later
- You can edit a rough story but not a blank page.

Who is it for?

- Different audiences may require different versions
 - Demographics
 - Catholics (familiar with 'the story') or non-Catholic/non-Christian
- Ask yourself, 'What will most impact my audience?'
- Unnecessary details vs. essential info
 - Witness stories are about you
- Are you writing for this to be published somewhere with a word limit?

The revision process: length

- Let your full written story sit for a few days
- Distill it to the most essential parts
 - Return to St. Paul's conversion story
 - Before Christ
 - Encounter(s)
 - Effects (internal and external)
 - o Different beginning/ending points depending on your audience
- My preference: addition instead of subtraction

The revision process: flow

- Consider your lede (where you begin)
 - When in doubt, go for the "punchiest" moment
 - Want something attention-grabbing
- It's OK if it's not chronological
- Consider the thread that ties together the different "scenes" of your story
 - See where the Holy Spirit has been moving in your life.
 - Use as transitions
- Where to end your story
 - Remember your story is still a work in progress
 - End with a "looking forward" note

The revision process: polish

- Ask a friend or mentor to read and suggest edits
- Reread and ask yourself:
 - How would this sound if I knew zero background info?
 - Is every sentence adding value? (If not, delete or rewrite it.)
 - Is your story and the intent clear?

Avoiding common pitfalls

- Believing your faith story seems "too ordinary" to share
- Too long

- Overly focused/detailed on your sin
- Using extremes or hyperbole
- Expecting immediate "results" from sharing your story

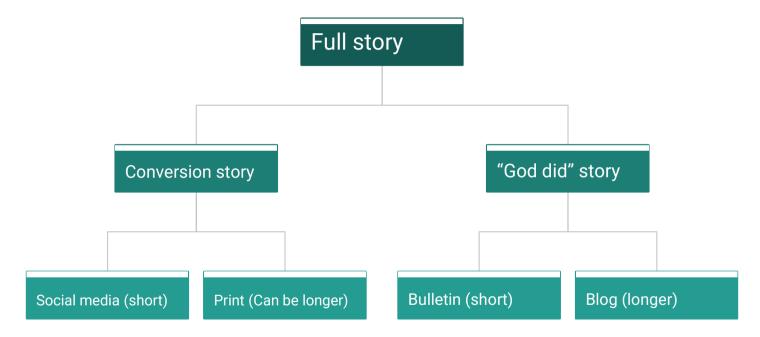
- Realize that most stories are "ordinary" and that God can use all things for good!
- Consider what details push your story forward
- Focus on God's merciful love (and use discretion)
- Pray for humility as you write
- Realize that we are called to plant seeds and trust the Holy Spirit to water them

Sharing

Where you might share:

- Blog
- Social media
- Parish/diocesan publication or bulletin (would need to be short)
- Prepared to share in conversations
- Pull pieces of your story for different audiences and formats

Don't reinvent the wheel
